from christina baker kline comes a novel about two women one about to age out of the foster care system the other 90 years old and carrying both a tremendous secret and a story of a life formed by a part of american history almost entirely forgotten the orphan trains molly ayer has one last chance and she knows it close to being kicked out of her foster home just months from turning 18 and aging out of the system molly should be grateful that her boyfriend found her a community service project helping an old lady clean out her home molly can't help but think that the 50 hours will be tedious but at least they II keep her out of juvie and right now that s all she cares about ninety one year old vivian daly has lived a quiet life on the coast of maine for decades but in her attic hidden in trunks are keys to a turbulent past molly is about to discover as she and vivian unpack her possessions and memories that vivian s story is a piece of america s tumultuous history now largely forgotten the tale of a young irish immigrant orphaned in new york city and put on a train to the midwest with hundreds of other orphaned children whose destiny would be determined by luck and chance as molly digs deeper she finds surprising parallels in her own experience as a penobscot indian and vivian s story and molly realizes that she has the power to help vivian find answers to mysteries that have haunted her for her entire life rich in detail and epic in scope the train rider is a powerful novel of upheaval and resilience of second chances of unexpected friendships and of the secrets we carry with us that keep us from finding out who we are

listen to child orphans as they share their memories of transition and adventure disappointment and loneliness but ultimately of the joy of belonging to their own new families they were throwaway kids living in the streets or in orphanages and foster homes then charles loring brace a young minister working with the poor in new york city started the children s aid society and devised a plan to give homeless children a chance to find families to call their own thus began an extraordinary migration of american children between 1854 and 1929 an estimated 200 000 children mostly from new york and other cities of the eastern united states ventured forth to other states on a journey of hope andrea warren has shared the stories of some of these orphan train riders here including those of betty who found a fairy tale life in a grand hotel nettie evans and her twin nellie who were rescued from their first abusive placement and taken in by a new kindhearted family who gave them the love they had hoped for brothers howard and fred who remained close even though they were adopted into different families and edith who longed to know the secrets of her past this is powerful nonfiction for classroom and personal reading and for discussion school library journal starred review

from 1850 to 1930 america witnessed a unique emigration and resettlement of at least 200 000 children and several thousand adults primarily from the east coast to the west this placing out an attempt to find homes for the urban poor was best known by the orphan trains that carried the children holt carefully analyzes the system initially instituted by the new york children's aid society in 1853 tracking its imitators as well as the reasons for its creation and demise she captures the children's perspective with the judicious use of oral histories institutional records and newspaper accounts this well written volume sheds new light on the multifaceted experience of children's immigration changing concepts of welfare and western expansion it is good scholarly social history library journal

this young readers edition of christina baker kline s 1 new york times bestselling novel orphan train follows a twelve year old foster girl who forms an unlikely bond with a ninety one year old woman adapted and condensed for a young audience orphan train girl includes an author s note and archival photos from the orphan train era this book is especially perfect for mother daughter reading groups molly ayer has been in foster care since she was eight years old most of the time molly knows it s her attitude that s the problem but after being shipped from one family to another she s had her fair share of adults treating her like an inconvenience so when molly s forced to help an a wealthy elderly woman clean out her attic for community service molly is wary but from the moment they meet molly realizes that vivian isn t like any of the adults she s encountered before vivian asks molly questions about her life and actually listens to the answers soon molly sees they have more in common than she thought vivian was once an orphan too an irish immigrant to new york city who was put on a so called orphan train to the midwest with hundreds of other children and she can understand better than anyone else the emotional binds that have been making molly s life so hard together they not only clear boxes of past mementos from vivian s attic but forge a path of friendship forgiveness and new beginnings

by the mid 1800 the street corners of new york city were home to several thousand homeless abandoned and orphaned children relief came with the establishment of the children's aid society in 1853 by one charles loring brace the society would gather likely orphans and send them west by train in groups of anywhere from 6 100 stopping at predetermined destinations where it was known foster homes were available agents were to visit these foster homes and write twice year of experiences the orphan trains of the children's aid society ran until 1929 and this text presents the story of one agent rev mr herman clarke

a riveting look at the orphan train from historical novelist jody hedlund when a financial crisis in 1850s new york leaves three orphaned sisters nearly destitute the oldest elise neumann knows she must take action she s had experience as a seamstress and the new york children s aid society has established a special service placing out seamstresses and trade girls even though elise doesn t want to leave her sisters for a job in illinois she realizes this may be their last chance the son of one of new york city s wealthiest entrepreneurs thornton quincy faces a dilemma his father is dying and in order to decide which of his sons will inherit everything he is requiring them to do two things in six months build a sustainable town along the illinois central railroad and get married thornton is tired of standing in his twin brother s shadow and is determined to win his father s challenge he doesn t plan on meeting a feisty young woman on his way west though

it seems incomprehensible that there was a time in america s not so distant past that nearly 200 000 children could be loaded on trains in large cities on our east coast sent to the rural midwest and presented for the picking to anyone who expressed an interest in them that s exactly what happened between the years 1854 and 1930 the primitive social experiment became known as placing out and had its origins in a new york city organization founded by charles loring brace called the children s aid society the society gathered up orphans half orphans and abandoned children from streets and orphanages and placed them on what are now referred

to as orphan trains it was brace s belief that there was always room for one more at a farmer s table the stories of the individual children involved in this great migration of little emigrants have nearly all been lost in the attic of american history in this book the author tells the true story of his paternal grandmother the late emily reese kidder who at the tender age of fourteen became one of the aforementioned children who rode an orphan train in 1906 emily was plucked from the elizabeth home for girls operated by the children s aid society and placed on a train along with eight other children bound for hopkinton iowa emily s journey as it turned out was only just beginning life had many lessons in store for her lessons that would involve overcoming adversity of perseverance love and great loss emily s story is told through the use of primary material oral history interviews and historical photographs it is a tribute to the human spirit of an extraordinary young girl who became a woman a woman to whom the heartfelt phrase there s no place like home had a very profound meaning

since the publication of her smash international bestseller orphan train christina baker kline has met with countless readers and book clubs and is often asked the same question about a key decision one of her protagonists makes in orphan train christina has longed to write a scene in which she clarifies vivian s motivations now in this newly released scene and within the book itself she gives her readers new insights into vivian s thoughts and feelings behind that fateful decision

lucy harold and david are orphans with no one to take care of them they are living on the city streets stealing and begging for food to survive like thousands of other unfortunate kids in the early 1900s when lucy and her little brothers are welcomed into an orphanage they get clean clothes and warm meals but the orphanage is overcrowded and groups of children are being sent to the midwest on orphan trains this seems exciting at first but as the train pulls into stations the kids are paraded in front of farmers who pick and choose which child they want to take home and rarely do sisters and brothers stay together conveyed through poignant verse and moving full color paintings this is a story of heartache and hope

this title examines an important historic event the orphan train movement easy to read compelling text explores the history of the children's aid society and the development of the brace school lodging houses and industrial schools the conditions that led to child abandonment in the 1800s problems with institutional care and child labor laws the roles the civil war the great depression and people like charles loring brace played and the effects of this event on society features include a table of contents glossary selected bibliography links source notes and an index plus a timeline and essential facts aligned to common core standards and correlated

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when their mother can no longer support them six siblings are sent by the children s aid society of new york city to live with farm families in missouri in 1860

can you imagine being placed in an orphanage while your parents are still alive that s what happens to nettie and nellie crook who are only five years old in 1910 when they are removed from their home in new york no one tells nettie and nellie why their parents can no longer care for them and later no one explains why the orphans are put on a train headed west the girls soon find themselves put on display in various small towns where prospective parents examine and select children for adoption nettie and nellie are taken by mr and mrs chapin will this be a happy ending for the twins based on a true story books are exciting historical fiction about real children who lived through extraordinary times in american history this title has common core connections

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
