this handbook explores and critiques a new sonic reality one which unearths new narratives that chart embryonic practices from the early twentieth century that have developed in parallel with accepted narratives of electronic music today s musical and artistic practices within technology based music represent radical changes in production engagement and dissemination of all sonic arts for composers musicians listeners media content creators and casual music users constant everyday exposure to electronic or processed sounds influences our listening skills and listening intentionality and our ideas of what constitutes valuable sound experiences have expanded radically what are we listening to how and why this new reality is also more inclusive and technology borne music now appears as the new folk music unwritten improvised and finding its own relevance unfettered by the traditional hierarchies of taste it is also where black and asian technology based experimental music is emerging with its own sonic genealogy where music is no longer limited to sound only but can be more fruitfully seen as a branch of media arts combining diverse materials techniques and tools into more holistic experiences

exploring the multiracial multiethnic line for the new century

the allure of empire traces how american ideas about race in the pacific were made and remade on the imperial stage before world war ii following the russo japanese war the united states cultivated an amicable relationship with japan based on the belief that it was a progressive empire akin to its own even as the two nations competed for influence in asia and clashed over immigration issues in the american west the mutual respect for empire sustained their transpacific cooperation until pearl harbor when both sides disavowed their history of collaboration and cast each other as incompatible enemies in recovering this lost history chris suh reveals the surprising extent to which debates about korea shaped the politics of interracial cooperation american recognition of japan as a suitable partner depended in part on a positive assessment of its colonial

rule of korea it was not until news of japan s violent suppression of koreans soured this perception that the exclusion of japanese immigrants became possible in the united states central to these shifts in opinion was the cooperation of various asian elites aspiring to inclusion in a progressive american empire by examining how korean japanese and other nonwhite groups appealed to the united states this book demonstrates that the imperial order sustained itself through a particular form of interracial collaboration that did not disturb the existing racial hierarchy

the second edition of melanie bush s acclaimed everyday forms of whiteness looks at the often unseen ways racism impacts our lives the author has interviewed and surveyed hundreds of college students and reveals that even though we talk as though we live in a post racial world after the election of barack obama racism is still very much a factor in everyday life the second edition incorporates new data and interviews to show how the everyday thinking of ordinary people contributes to the perpetuation of systemic racialized inequality the book introduces key terms for the study for race and ethnicity reveals the mechanisms that support the racial hierarchy in u s society then outlines ways we can challenge long standing patterns of racial inequality

the experiences and voices of multiracial individuals are challenging current categories of race profoundly altering the meaning of racial identity and in the process changing the cultural fabric of the nation exploring this new reality the authors of mixed messages examine what we know about multiracial identities and the implications of those identities for fundamental issues of justice and equality

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
