morton argues that the chief stumbling block to environmental thinking is the image of nature most writers promote they propose a new world view but their very zeal to preserve the natural world leads them away from the nature they revere to have a properly ecological view morton suggests we must relinquish once and for all the idea of nature

the anthropocene narrative reproduces an ideological divide between society and nature and forecloses an inclusive politics of global warming

utilizing françois laruelle s non philosophical method smith constructs a unified theory of philosophical theology and ecology by challenging environmental philosophy and theology claiming that and engagement with scientific ecology can radically change the standard metaphysics of nature as well as ethical problems related to the natural

critical plant studies in taiwan presents a historical overview of vegetal ecocriticism in taiwan divided into 12 chapters it examines the human plant entanglements on the island covering a wide spectrum of topics such as the imperial plant explorations the military casuarina afforestation the mangrove conservation movement the ecofeminist rooftop garden the indigenous millet restoration the underground mycorrhizal network in urban taipei etc it discloses the phyto politics in the historical context of the vegetal materialist condition of the island intersecting the poetics and politics of plant narratives it presents the multispecies plantscapes of the island the first of its kind the collection launches the historical and localized critical plant studies in taiwan

first book length ecocritical study of cold war american literature compelling analyses of the function and representation of nature in a wide range of cold war fiction and poetry by authors including paul bowles j d salinger jack kerouac allen ginsberg and mary mccarthy reveals the prevalence of portrayals of nature as an infinite interdependent system in american literature written between 1945 and 1971 daw astutely highlights the cold war s often overlooked role in environmental history and argues that rachel carson s silent spring 1962 can be considered as part of a trend of increasingly ecological depictions of nature in literature written after 1945 by exploring the most recent developments in the field of ecocriticism the book is embedded within current ecocritical debates concerning the anthropocene and anthropogenic climate change key

features contains five case studies of six cold war writers paul bowles peggy pond church j d salinger jack kerouac allen ginsberg and mary mccarthy offers an in depth exploration of the influences behind each writer s presentation of nature shows the cold war to be a time of seismic change in the human s relationship to the environment and demonstrates the degree to which this inflects cold war literature engages with the most recent developments in the field of ecocriticism which drive the study s analytical methodology and embed the book within current ecocritical debates

a genetics expert and professor challenges our understanding of intelligence explaining what it truly means to be smart why conventional assessments are misleading and what everyone can do to optimize their potential growing up in middle class suburban los angeles in the 1980s rina bliss saw intelligence as her ticket out like height and stature intelligence was said to run in families the prevailing idea was that mental capacity was determined by our dna and could be measured a simple iq test could predict a child s future yet once dr bliss looked closer first as a student then as a scientist and later as a mom of identical twins who share a genome she began to challenge conventional wisdom about innate intelligence in rethinking intelligence she shares her findings drawing on cutting edge scientific research to offer a new model for how we understand define and assess intelligence using a measurement that is far more flexible and expansive intelligence has little to do with standardized test results or other conventional measures of intellect dr bliss argues intelligence is a process a journey defined by change that cannot be scored or taken away intelligence is influenced by our surroundings in ways that are often overlooked more than baby mozart or flash cards or superfoods factors like stress connection and play actually sculpt young minds in rethinking intelligence dr bliss shares insights from the burgeoning science of epigenetics to help us harness our environments to empower our minds if we truly want to nurture potential we must eliminate toxic stress so that our genes can work optimally in harmony with our environment dr bliss offers successful strategies we can use as individuals and a society including embracing a growth mindset prioritizing connection becoming more mindful and reforming systemic issues poverty racism the lack of quality early childhood education that have a negative and lasting neurobiological impact joining acclaimed works by carol dweck amy cuddy and james clear rethinking intelligence reframes human behavior and intellect offering a new perspective for understanding ourselves and our children and the practical tools necessary to thrive

in addition to the texts of walden and civil disobedience this revised and expanded norton critical edition reprints the increasingly important works slavery in massachusetts walking and wild apples all texts are accompanied by annotations

thomas havens shows how revolutionary officials in the 1870s seized private properties and converted them into public parks for educating and managing citizens in the new emperor sanctioned state rebuilding tokyo and yokohama after the earthquake and fires of 1923 spurred the spread of urban parklands both in the capital and other cities according to havens the growth of suburbs the national mobilization of world war ii and the post 1945 american occupation helped speed the creation of more urban parks setting the stage for vast increases in public green spaces during japan s golden age of affluence from the 1960s through the 1980s since the 1990s the japanese public has embraced a heightened ecological consciousness and become

deeply involved in the design and management of both city and natural parks realms once monopolized by government bureaucrats as in other prosperous countries public private partnerships have increasingly become the norm in operating parks for public benefit yet the heavy hand of officialdom is still felt throughout japan s open lands

this book uses the theme of debatable lands a term first applied to disputed parts of the anglo scottish border to explore aspects of writing in the romantic period walter scott brought it to a wider public and the phrase came to be applied by metaphorical extension to debates which were not so much geographical but intellectual political or artistic these debates are pursued in a collection of essays grouped under the headings britain and ireland and europe and beyond

the concepts of ireland and irishness are in constant flux in the wake of an ever increasing reappraisal of the notion of cultural and national specificity in a world assailed from all angles by the forces of globalisation and uniformity reimagining ireland interrogates ireland s past and present and suggests possibilities for the future by looking at ireland s literature culture and history and subjecting them to the most up to date critical appraisals associated with sociology literary theory historiography political science and theology
