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this resource is written for classroom teachers art education specialists childcare workers artists working in schools parents who home school their children and school administrators it can also be used as a university textbook for education students the book provides a framework for teaching art in a way that is integrated with regular classroom practice and mindful of current art curriculum outcomes although the book focuses on art for primary and middle school students from pre school to grade eight teaching art is also useful to art specialists at the high school level who are looking for new strategies or project ideas to add to their established secondary programs revised and expanded from the author s previous resource art illustration this resource integrates new developments in art education

how to teach art to children is designed to increase pupil awareness of the different kinds of art it gives pupils a wide range of experiences and helps them to appreciate the art around them most importantly it lets them know that there is no wrong way to do art the activities in part 1 introduce the seven basic elements of art line shape colour value tones texture and form each section begins with a definition of the element and provides a series of art experiences that allow young artists to experiment with the element experiences are labelled as large group small group partner or individual activities each element is introduced with a large group experience and then pupils' understanding is extended with small group and independent projects all the experiences are designed to encourage pupils to explore materials and techniques rather than to simply complete projects there are 96 projects to undertake with step by step directions and full colour examples part 2 of how to teach art to children focuses on 24 famous artists and cultures and shows how they use the seven elements of art in different ways in their art the

accompanying activities allow pupils to experience the style of each artist

it also was found that beginning art teachers teach the skills they feel best prepared to teach and that studio production is the preferred mode of art instruction the teachers in this study were more often influenced by the teacher supervising their internship during their teacher training than by their professors or other education courses and the classroom observations and internship were perceived as the most valuable component of their training the participants also described problems they encountered in teaching which they were not prepared for of which the most frequently cited were lack of respect and support for the arts in k 12 schools and lack of sufficient funding

creating meaningful art and learning to teach art in a meaningful way involve taking risks as a student teacher every daily element of teaching involves risk and creates the potential for conflict this includes class instruction student interaction classroom management and fostering meaningful connections between students and their artwork my research questions address how risk taking and conflict operate in a student teacher s high school art classroom how do risk taking and conflict impact the experience of learning to teach art in a chicago high school classroom what is the relationship between conflict and creativity in the context of students learning how does a student teacher translate her development as a classroom art educator into a critical and personally meaningful theory of teaching my research took place during seven weeks of student teaching at a chicago public high school i explored my research questions while teaching a six week unit plan in which art i students created sculptures of a single piece of clothing my experience as a student art teacher is the context for my research on teaching student learning and learning to teach art in my thesis i compare the developmental territory shared by student teachers and youth of confidence building risk taking and confronting the emotional atmosphere of an art classroom within that space student teachers and adolescents search for their voices as educators and as adults following in the work of deborah britzman 2009 and nakkula and toshalis 2006 i argue that risk taking needs to be reframed as a necessary platform for meaningful teaching and art making data was triangulated from a variety of sources including multiple journals on teaching from the perspective of lesson planning connections with academic research and daily reflections my thesis also incorporates written feedback from students and my cooperating teacher and the students artwork i hope that my research will spur new perspectives in the fields of art education critical pedagogy and teacher education regarding the role of risk and conflict in student teaching and art education this involves introducing a theory of learning with students in academic creative emotional and developmental ways by learning with students i believe that critical educators can form more authentic connections through their teaching i also suggest that the process of finding the courage to confront risks and conflict collaboratively may result in more meaningful student artwork and more capable art teachers

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
