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how to thrive as a solo librarian is a compilation of chapters by librarians offering advice to colleagues who must work alone or with very limited help the contributors come from schools and colleges special and corporate archives public libraries and seasoned librarians across the united states and abroad who are familiar with the vigor dedication and creativity necessary for solo librarians as noted in the foreword in many ways solo librarianship demands more communication and collaboration than librarians might experience in larger multi employee libraries despite the fact that most of the authors are currently working alone in their library or archives they do not work in a vacuum these chapters aim to help librarians thrive in the demanding environment that exists for the solo librarian topics covered include time management community involvement public relations and marketing professional development internet based ideas administrative tasks assessing and moving collections and general overviews how to thrive as a solo librarian will be useful for all professionals and students in the field of librarianship

librarianship is a great career this book is for anyone who is attracted to becoming a librarian and who wants to know more about the profession what librarians do what librarians are all about the different types of professional jobs there are in libraries and how to get started

do you get books from a public library in your town or even in your school library in many remote areas of the world there are no library buildings in many countries books are delivered in unusual way by bus boat elephant donkey train even by wheelbarrow why would librarians go to the trouble of packing books on the backs of elephants or driving miles to deliver books by bus because as one librarian in azerbaijan says books are as important to us as air or water this is the intriguing photo essay a celebration of books readers and libraries

the role of academic librarian is far from cut and dried there are numerous job classifications and widely varying academic focuses and cultures to contend with while every academic librarian is expected to meet the research needs of an institution s faculty and students many are expected to assume other obligations as part of a faculty or tenure system given the many variants library school alone cannot prepare individuals for every aspect and flavor of academic librarianship and intrepid librarians who find themselves in new places and positions face unique challenges the successful academic librarian is an antidote to the stress and burnout that almost every academic librarian

experiences at one time or another in its pages gwen meyer gregory and nearly 20 of her peers take a practical approach to a range of critical topics their advice war stories tips techniques and inspiration will help you thrive in your academic library career from back cover

what kind of information would you find in a special library well did you know for example that william shakespeare had a younger brother named edmund who was an actor the siblings were born in stratford upon avon about 100 miles northwest of london as an adult edmund followed his older brother william to london but the pair never worked on a production together or even came close to working together in the field they both loved it is all true you can look it up where at the folger shakespeare library in washington dc a special library dealing with all things shakespeare the folger shakespeare library is one of thousands of special libraries located throughout the united states and around the world special libraries are unique repositories of very specific data dealing with

detailed information on a particular subject if you can think of a topic of interest you can probably find a special library that has a collection of information about it most likely not found anywhere else having all this material is wonderful but it is only valuable if it can be made available to people to use especially in research special librarians organize these repositories of specialized information so researchers can make the maximum use of the information special librarian is a fascinating career because it allows you to combine a variety of your talents and interests while many public and school librarians deal with books and periodicals covering a wide range of topics your job as a special librarian has a keener focus your library skills have to be top notch but you also must be an expert in the topic covered by the library where you work while you may not be a doctor if you are a special librarian in a medical library you would know the difference between a ligament and a tendon you have to know where to get information on both plus other even more technical medical information similarly a special librarian working at the library housed at the early ford v 8 foundation museum in auburn indiana would have a rooted love for and background in cars this in addition to being able to draw on the savvy of a book and data chronicler to sort through and catalogue the comprehensive facts and figures about ford automobiles of a bygone era contained in the repository's exhaustive collection of printed materials related to the vehicles if you are passionate about a specific subject being a special librarian is the perfect job in the perfect work environment

of academic research libraries allowing the head university librarian to focus on the acquisition of resources through fundraising and external public relations although the positions of assistant or associate university librarians and deans are considered a training ground for upward movement in the profession there are surprisingly few mentoring experiences available the associate university librarian handbook a resource guide looks to change that bradford lee eden has brought together a variety of helpful topics for university librarians the first section provides a broad overview of the field and what it means to be an associate librarian a section on managing change a topic endemic to the academic library in these times follows the next section deals with the question of funding the library enterprise and managing resources with chapters on how best to handle budget reductions cultivating donors and donor relations and managing a research function the fourth section covers career management and includes chapters on navigating the transition to university librarian a concluding section deals with leadership and defining the future intended for both those in the position of associate university librarian and for those aspiring to get there the associate university librarian handbook will be a valuable tool and guide

the library profession has changed rapidly in the wake of advanced technologies once regarded as the gatekeepers of information found in books today s library professionals are shifting from a traditional center of attention to a new focus on all areas of information studies technology and professional identify of librarians the making of the cybrarian brings into focus both the positive and negative aspects that technology places on the professional identity of librarians highlighting the new methods involved in data management communication and library information education and research this book is a necessary means for librarians students and researchers to obtain an up to date understanding of what it means to maintain relevancy in the information age

this sequel to the black librarian in america scarecrow 1970 contains an array of contributors representing a new generation of african american librarians addressing the same perplexing problems that their predecessors examined this volume is being issued at a time when there is a great concern about cultural diversity in the country cultural diversity is laudable but the pervasive problem in the country is institutional racism all of the contributors agree that it is racism that should be eradicated if a truly multicultural society that represents cultural diversity is to develop a wide range of topics are explored in addition a profile of dorothy porter wesley one of the pioneer african american librarians librarians and archivists as writers and a provocative essay by congresswoman major r owens on the specter of racism in an age of cultural diversity the new paradigm for african american librarians among the contributors are carolyn o frost herman l totten carla hayden charles m brown alexander boyd jesse carney smith james f williams ii lou helen saunders ina a brown vivian davidson hewitt monteria hightower ella gaines yates and ann allen shockley especially designed for professional librarians library school students and other information professionals this volume would be a useful addition to african american collections and other scholarly collections dealing with american society a copious index that is cross referenced makes it very useful as a reference tool

the library is a crucial resource on which many people depend it has books and resources for research or for pleasure reading there are computers available to the public dvds and newspaper articles the library also hosts group activities for kids such as storytelling crafts music and games the librarian is in charge of the library and keeps everything organized

and running smoothly this must have book explains what a librarian does and the different things available to do at the library colorful photographs of a wide range of activities provide readers with close textual correlations

reference librarians are no longer expected to know much about the information they find they are merely expected to find it technological competency rather than knowledge has become the order of the day in many respects reference service has become a matter of typing search terms into a library's online catalog or a web search engine and providing the patron with the results of the search calling for a re intellectualization of reference librarianship this book suggests another approach to providing quality reference service reading the authors surveyed both academic reference librarians and public library reference personnel in the united states and canada about their reading habits from the 950 responses the authors present findings about the extent to which librarians read newspapers periodicals fiction and nonfiction and recount and analyze stories about how reading has made them better librarians the authors also report that north american professors in the humanities and social sciences believe that the best reference librarians are those who have wide ranging subject based knowledge as opposed to the type of process based functional knowledge that is increasingly dominating the curricula of many library and information science programs

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
