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tang soo do chung do kwan describes the creation history and evolution of the first korean kwan to teach martial arts called tang soo do in late 1944 by the ching do kwan founder grandmaster won kuk lee who was the first korean martial arts master to use the name tang soo do to describe the japanese style of korean karate he taught it was also korea s first post world war ii martial art that would get grandmaster won kuk lee arrested imprisoned and put on trial as a japanese sympathizer because he was allowed to teach tang soo do with the japanese still in control of korea and later his tang soo do was so successful it became a threat to the new korean independent government that his reputation was tarnished the author describes chung do kwan s travels through the new post world war ii korean government s work to close the chung do kwan tang soo do and the government forces that wanted chung do kwan tang soo do to be changed to chung do kwan tae kwon do the author includes grandmaster won kuk lee s relationship with the japanese occupying forces in korea that allowed him to teach tang soo do just before the japanese were forced to leave korea by the u s military and the u s military general that invited grandmaster won kuk lee to immigrate to the united states and avoid his enemies in the new young independent korean government that was destroying many korean martial arts founders they could call a japanese sympathizer from an earlier time the author describes the entire evolution of the chung do kwan tang soo do as the first kwan to teach tang soo do and as a political entity for the korean government grandmaster won kuk lee s many contribution to the development of chung do kwan tae kwon do and grandmaster won kuk lee s dedication to taekwondo s journey to the 1988 olympics this book is for the experienced and serious

korean martial arts enthusiast

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this book is but one source of many regarding the popular but all too fictitious facts about korean martial arts as one of the most published authors on korean martial arts there is no shortage of experts in the martial arts community and no shortage of critics one cannot be qualified as knowledgeable simply by the time spent in the physical training aspects of tang soo do while allowed to ignore the academic aspects this author's facts and suggestions are no more correct or valid than any other person's that publish what they have learned or been exposed too since almost all known sources of historical information about ancient and recent korean martial arts and fighting arts was destroyed and then rewritten by the japanese occupational forces during the 19th and 20th century occupation of korea there is no one person regardless of their title or time in training who can have any more verifiable information than the rest of us again due to the extermination and conversion of nearly all historical facts on korean martial arts and korean history any grandmaster master and instructor can be an expert using the fictitious facts they get exposed to during their training and only then can just state their personnel opinions and opinions are not facts this book and all books simply provides the author's perspective as only any book can and particularly books on korean martial arts for those individuals who want people to read the books from whom they believe have the correct facts we know that as fascism for those practitioners who need to believe that their grandmaster master or instructor is the source of all correct information about tang soo do and korean martial arts these same people need to believe that only they know who the true experts are and so can not value the contributions of others ideas and perspectives we usually call this behavior when followers believe that there is only one all knowing all seeing person and they know who it is as cult behavior and cults are illegal in the united states but not korea it is our freedom of speech that motivates authors to write and publish books with new and different interpretations of age old facts and common knowledge so let the community decide the worth of what is published this small book presents simple and complex answers and suggestions to just a few of the many questions that ought to get asked during tang soo do training and these are solely the author's opinions and interpretations students and instructors in tang soo do should ask these and many others and answer for themselves at sometime in their training most books on tang soo do show the wonderful physical aspects and results from the training with little regard for an academic education in the style they train in it is hoped by the author that the questions and answers in this book will spark more serious discussions and dialog not less as many suggest and to help to expose what historical references exist as the fiction they are as all history books are fiction history is all fiction and usually written by the victor for those who find this book unacceptable please use this book as the motivation to write and publish your own book and contribute to the community in a meaningful way those that complain the quickest and the most are the least likely to do the work others do and provide their own opinions for others to scrutinize its always easier to be critical of the work of others than expose what you know and what you don't the knowledge of tang soo do training is not in the hands of a few individuals but spread throughout every school and is in the minds of every person working to get better and be a better person in tang soo do use the knowledge that when criticism for others comes to you easier than praise all your training didn't stick but was left at the door jam when you left the dojang

the other kwans that taught their version of tang soo do mixing chuan fa kwon bup shaolin fighting art and tai chi chuan tae kuek kwan such as the moo duk kwan kang duk kwan kuk moo kwan jung do kwan yun moo kwan o do kwan sang moo kwan chang moo kwan chung do kwan moo duk kwan the author includes a list of the hyungs of tang soo do a list of important events that led to the creation of tang soo do a korean martial arts chronology covering many thousands of years a comprehensive hyung to kata conversion table for tang soo do hyungs the author also includes a substantial 80 reference bibliography glossary and index for the serious reader s convenience

tang soo do korean empty hand self defense complete book of hyungs includes step by step written instructions and drawings for learning the 25 tang soo do hyungs including kee cho il bu kee cho e bu kee cho sum bu pyung cho dan pyung ahn e dan pyung ahn sum dan pyung sa dan pyung oh dan nai hanji cho dan nai hanji e dan nai hanji sum dan bassai cho bassai dai jiin ship sum sip soo jion ginto jitti wang shu kang sang koon so kang sang koon dai o sip sa bo dai tae kuek kwan so tae keuk kwon dai and sojin also included is a unique history of tang soo do the relationship between each hyung and its symbol usually an animal the importance to tang soo do as taught by the early korean kwans and a definition of the korean kwan leaders all the early minor and major kwans and the kwan creators and their styles taught at each kwan is included almost 1000 new drawings have been added for the reader to better understand each step of each hyung each drawing is numbered and matches with a numbered written instruction line drawings are included matching hyung movements and directions of motion for each of step of the hyungs providing a high level perspective drawing of the area a practitioner moves through as he executes each hyung these diagrams allows the practitioner to see the hyungs in several perspectives to better understand what the creator had intended it also includes is a matrix for correlating the korean hyungs to its japanese and okinawan kata counterpart illustrating which ones are the same or similar an east west chronology included illustrates the development of korean martial arts to events around the world and over centuries the book is to be used only as a learning aid to supplement the formal instructions from a black belt tang soo do instructor these aids are not intended to replace an instructor nor to be used to learn the hyungs before an instructor decides a student is ready to do so

this stunning reference book is the culmination of thirteen years of study under grandmaster myung seok seo my teacher this book covers eleven forms from first dan to second dan midnight blue belt and includes photographs and detailed instructions of each movement this book offers an easy to learn method which everyone can benefit from while at the same time increasing your knowledge of the more exotic forms of tang soo do

dan testing forms from cho dan black belt through 9th dan black belt this manual has the information for an instructor to produce students instructors and master instructors consistent in performance knowledge understanding experience wisdom patience humility quality and effectiveness with those from local national and international tang soo do organizations this manual is not for the student who has no need for this information and is unable to grasp its significance for opening a new martial arts school or creating a new martial arts organization included are the instructions for three kee cho hyungs from grandmaster hwang kee s moo duk kwan and five pyung ahn nai hanji and passai cho hyujngs from the grandmaster won kuk lee s chung do kwan and an additional complete set of 10 gup test forms as examples to develop tailed one s by the reader as an appendix
