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a canada reads 2019 finalist a penguin book club pick winner of the 2017 rogers writers trust fiction prize david chariandy s brother is his intensely beautiful searingly powerful and tightly constructed second novel exploring questions of masculinity family race and identity as they are played out in a scarborough housing complex during the sweltering heat and simmering violence of the summer of 1991 with shimmering prose and mesmerizing precision david chariandy takes us inside the lives of michael and francis they are the sons of trinidadian immigrants their father has disappeared and their mother works double sometimes triple shifts so her boys might fulfill the elusive promise of their adopted home coming of age in the park a cluster of town houses and leaning concrete towers in the disparaged outskirts of a sprawling city michael and francis battle against the careless prejudices and low expectations that confront them as young men of black and brown ancestry teachers stream them into general classes shopkeepers see them only as thieves and strangers quicken their pace when the brothers are behind them always michael and francis escape into the cool air of the rouge valley a scar of green wilderness that cuts through their neighbourhood where they are free to imagine better lives for themselves propelled by the pulsing beats and styles of hip hop francis the older of the two brothers dreams of a future in music michael s dreams are of aisha the smartest girl in their high school whose own eyes are firmly set on a life elsewhere but the bright hopes of all three are violently irrevocably thwarted by a tragic shooting and the police crackdown and suffocating suspicion that follow with devastating emotional force david chariandy a unique and exciting voice in canadian literature crafts a heartbreaking and timely story about the profound love that exists between brothers and the senseless loss of lives cut short with the shot of a gun

there is as you pick it up nothing to prepare you for its power observer quite simply one of the most beautiful books i have ever read aminatta forna how do we navigate our complex histories for our children what is our duty to share and what must we leave for them to discover writing to his daughter david chariandy asks difficult unsettling perhaps impossible questions questions made all the more poignant by our current political landscape with tender spare and luminous prose chariandy looks both into his heart and mind and out to the world and humanity in the tradition of ta nehisi coates and chimamanda ngozi adichie this is a book about race this is a book about family

the beauty of the moment meets exit pursued by a bear award winning thriller writer sheena kamal delivers a kick ass debut ya novel that will have fans crying out for more love and violence in some families they re bound up together dysfunctional and poisonous passed from generation to generation like eye color or a quirk of smile trisha s trying to break the chain channeling her violent impulses into muay thai kickboxing an unlikely sport for a slightly built girl of trinidadian descent her father comes and goes as he pleases his presence adding a layer of tension to the toronto east end townhouse that trisha and her mom call home every punch he lands on her mother carving itself indelibly into trisha s mind until the night he wanders out drunk in front of the car trisha is driving practicing on her learner s permit her mother in the passenger seat her father is killed and her mother seems strangely at peace lighter somehow trisha doesn t know exactly what happened that night but she s afraid it s going to happen again her mom has a new man in her life and the patterns they are repeating

seminar paper from the year 2012 in the subject english language and literature studies literature grade 1-7 university of rostock institut für anglistik und amerikanistik course witchcraft memory and the legacy of sugar in caribbean literature language english abstract african american slavery and racism that black people and other ethnic minorities often had and still have to face in their every day lives in canada are disabled from canadian history and their modern representation when associations are made to the topic of slavery most people do not know that slavery existed in canada because slave trade mostly took place in the larger atlantic ocean and america therefore it was suppressed from canadian's history even if it is very much a part of it the novel *soucouyant* by david chariandy published in 2007 picks out main topics as forgetting and remembering trauma dislocation family but also racism as a central theme however i want to emphasize on all these themes in the subsequent chapters whereas the topic of family will be on the fringes also i would like to present how racism in canada developed and how a traumatic event is processed in one's mind for the illustration of these subjects i will use the novel *soucouyant* as well as the hanging of angélique but will mostly concentrate on *soucouyant* because it allows a great deal of interpretation in the context of themes as racism memory and trauma

the idea of resilience is everywhere these days offering a framework for thriving in volatile times dominant resilience stories share an attachment to a mythologized past thought to hold clues for navigating a future that is understood to be full of danger these stories also uphold values of settler colonialism and white supremacy what the world might look like examines the way resilience thinking has come to dominate the settler colonial imagination and explores alternative approaches to resilience writing that instead offer decolonial models of thought the book traces settler colonial resilience stories to the rise of resilience science in the 1970s and 1980s illustrating how the discipline supports the projects of white supremacy and colonialism working to unravel the blanket of common sense that shrouds the idea of resilience the book is equally cautious of settler colonial antiresilience stories that invoke the idea of death as an antidote to unbearable life susie o'brien argues that although the dominant narratives of resilience are problematic resilience itself is neither inherently good nor inherently bad appreciating the significance of resilience stories requires asking what worlds and what communities they are meant to preserve looking at the fiction of alexis wright david chariandy and leanne betasamosake simpson o'brien points to the potential of black and indigenous thinking around resilience to figure decolonial possibilities for planetary flourishing exposing the complexities and limits of resilience what the world might look like questions the concept of resilience highlighting how black and indigenous novelists can offer different decolonial ways of thinking about and with resilience to imagine things otherwise
