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with so many women approaching their diets body image and pursuit of a slender figure with slavish devotion the religion of thinness is a timely addition to the discussion of our cultural obsession with weight loss at the heart of this obsession is the belief that in order to be happy one must be slim and the attendant myths rituals images and moral codes can leave some women with severe emotional

damage idealized images in the media inspire devotees of this religion to experience guilt for behaviors that are biologically normal and necessary and lelwica offers two ways to combat this dangerous cultural message advising readers to look hard at the societal cues that cause them to obsess about their weight and to remain mindful about their actions and needs this book will not only help stop the cycle of guilt and shame associated with food it will help readers to grow and accept their bodies as they are

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each year americans spend millions of dollars on diet foods and weight loss programs bringle offers a spiritual solution to this widely misinterpreted cult of thinness and provides guidance for those who seek to understand the dynamics of food addiction

hidden buddhas may well be liza dalby s best work yet with its fascinating story of characters caught up in a world they themselves don t understand besides taking us on a journey through little known corners of japan it offers us an engaging and believable portrait of people driven to do things they may not have imagined arthur golden author of memoirs of a geisha according to buddhist theology the world is suffering through a final corrupt era called mapp as mapp continues chaos will increase until the center can no longer hold then the world will end in japan many believe that miroku buddha of the future will appear and bring about a new age of enlightenment from this ancient notion of doom and rebirth comes a startling new novel by the acclaimed author of geisha and the tale of murasaki hundreds of

temples in japan are known to keep mysterious hidden buddhas secreted away except on rare designated viewing days these statues are not hidden because they are powerful their power lies in their being hidden are they being protected or are they protecting the world in this novel one buddhist priest struggles with the dictates of his inherited orthodoxy while another rebels an american graduate student begins to suspect the mysterious purpose of the hidden buddhas just as he falls in love with a beautiful japanese artist who is haunted by an aborted child the weaving of karma that brings these two together results in a tech savvy half western half japanese child who text messages her way through the profane world to enlightenment tracing the lives of its characters through the late twentieth century to the present from paris to kyoto to california hidden buddhas turns a cosmopolitan eye on discipline and decadence in religion fashion politics and modern life liza dalby is an anthropologist and writer specializing in japan she lives in berkeley california

over the past thirty years much has been written about the critical theory of society that was produced by a small group of left wing hegelians in the institute of social research in frankfurt am main germany and in the united states this book seeks to make a contribution to the continued development of the critical theory of society and religion as it offers a corrective to the one sided positivistic development of the modern social sciences as well as to the increasing social irrelevancy of the contemporary christian church max horkheimer s critical theory of religion is a content analysis of the critical theory of religion of max horkheimer which was developed throughout almost all of his writings and later interviews from 1926 to 1973 the year of his death

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what happens when your body doesn't look how it's supposed to look or feel how it's supposed to feel or do what it's supposed to do who or what defines the ideals behind these expectations how can we challenge them and live more peacefully in our bodies *shameful bodies* religion and the culture of physical improvement explores these questions by examining how traditional religious narratives and modern philosophical assumptions come together in the construction and pursuit of a better body in contemporary western societies drawing on examples from popular culture such as self-help books magazines and advertisements michelle mary lelwica shows how these narratives and assumptions encourage us to go to war against our bodies to fight fat triumph over disability conquer chronic pain and illness and defy aging through an ethic of conquest and conformity the culture of physical improvement trains us not only to believe that all bodily processes are under our control but to feel ashamed about those parts of our flesh that refuse to comply with the cultural ideal lelwica argues that such shame is not a natural response to being fat physically impaired chronically sick or old rather body shame is a religiously and culturally conditioned reaction to a commercially fabricated fantasy of physical perfection while *shameful bodies* critiques the religious and cultural norms and narratives that perpetuate external and internalized judgment and aggression toward shameful bodies it also engages the resources of religions especially feminist theologies and buddhist thought practice to construct a more affirming approach to health and healing an approach that affirms the diversity fragility interdependence and impermanence of embodied life

paul helm presents a new study of the nature of religious faith investigating what makes it reasonable religious belief needs to meet and sustain philosophical scrutiny just as any other type of belief does nothing about religion purchases immunity from this but at the same time religious epistemology must also respect the contours of religion the distinctiveness of the subject matter of religious belief helm looks sympathetically at two currently prominent ways of defending the rationality of religious belief reformed epistemology and the cumulative case for theism he argues

that the reasonableness of faith depends not only on beliefs about the world but also on beliefs about oneself for instance about what one wants about one's hopes and fears and on what one is willing to trust. Helm goes on to look at the relations between belief and trust and between faith and virtue and concludes with an exploration of one particular type of belief about oneself the belief that one is oneself a believer. This is a book for anyone interested in the basis of religious faith.
