they are presented with empathy and understanding Don't Be Afraid to Experiment Play with different character types perspectives and voices to 3 find what works best for your story Conclusion Creating memorable and impactful characters is a rewarding process By carefully crafting their backgrounds motivations and relationships you bring them to life on the page making your story compelling and engaging for your readers Remember strong character development is the key to creating a world that feels real relatable and truly unforgettable

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clinical fictions psychoanalytic novelists and short story writers is the first book to explore works of fiction written by prominent psychoanalysts broken down into thematic sections the book traces the literary output of pioneering psychoanalysts such as julia kristeva bruce fink thomas odgen and gregorio kohon among others berman looks at works of historical fiction detective fiction and the short story and shows how recurring themes typical of these genres can be understood both psychoanalytically and through a literary lens the works included investigate experiences of childhood adversity life in dystopian societies experiences of psychosis bodily autonomy personal loss and above all trauma unpacking these themes and their depiction through fiction berman gives the reader the tools to apply psychoanalytic literary theory to further works interweaving his personal correspondence with authors including a heartwarming exchange with cliff wilkerson berman offers unparalleled access to the inner workings of the writers minds this book will be of interest to students and researchers using psychoanalytic literary theory as well as mental health practitioners who are interested in the intersections between literature and psychoanalysis and discovering new ways of probing the unspoken and unconscious

the twelfth century was a time of cultural renewal and innovation in byzantium just as it was in the west in literature the long disused genres of epic satire and the novel or romance took new forms during that century at the same time in language the vernacular made its first tentative literary appearances these developments continued uninterrupted through the late byzantine and early modern periods scholarship since the nineteenth century has been sharply divided over these texts do they represent the first breakthrough of an emergent modern greek literature or merely a footnote to the byzantine learned tradition what in particular do they have to tell us about the collective self definition of the greek speakers who wrote them roughly during the period 1100 1600 and how has their subsequent reception contributed to defining and consolidating the national identity of the modern greeks since the nation state was established in the 1820s the papers collected in this book explore the relation between literary texts and collective consciousness scrutinizing the evidence of the texts themselves in their late or post byzantine context and assessing how their reception both influenced and was influenced by the processes of nation building in modern greece

transnational politics in the post 9 11 novel suggests that literature after september 11 2001 reflects the shift from bilateral nation state politics to the multilateralism of transnational politics while much of the criticism regarding novels of 9 11 tends to approach these works through theories of personal and collective trauma this book argues for the evolution of a post 9 11 novel that pursues a transversal approach to global conflicts that are unlikely to be resolved without diverse peoples willing to set aside sectarian interests these novels embrace not only american writers such as don delillo dave eggers ken kalfus thomas pynchon and amy waldman but also the

countervailing perspectives of global novelists such as j m coetzee orhan pamuk mohsin hamid and laila halaby these are not novels about terror ism nor do they seek comfort in the respectful cloak of national mourning rather they are instances of the novel in terror which recognizes that everything having been changed after 9 11 only the formally inventive presentation will suffice to acknowledge the event s unrepresentability and its shock to the political order

this volume looks at the representation of 9 11 and the resulting wars in european literature in the face of inner european divisions the texts under consideration take the terror attacks as a starting point to negotiate european as well as national identity while the volume shows that these identity formations are frequently based on the construction of two others the us nation and a cultural ethnic idea of muslim communities it also analyses examples which undermine such constructions this much more self critical strand in european literature unveils the eurocentrism of a supposedly general humanistic value system through the use of complex aesthetic strategies these strategies are in itself characteristic of the european reception as the anglo irish british dutch flemish french german italian and polish perspectives collected in this volume perceive of the terror attacks through the lens of continental media and semiotic theory

radical planes 9 11 and patterns of continuity edited by dunja m mohr and birgit dāwes explores the intersections between narrative disruption and continuity in post 9 11 narratives from an interdisciplinary transnational perspective foregrounding the transatlantic cultural memory of 9 11 contesting the earlier notion of a cataclysm that has changed everything and critically reflecting on american exceptionalism the collection offers an inquiry into what has gone unchanged in terms of pre 9 11 post 9 11 and post post 9 11 issues and what silences persist how do literature and performative and visual arts negotiate this precarious balance of a pervasive discourse of change and emerging patterns of political ideological and cultural continuity

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
