seminar paper from the year 2020 in the subject english language and literature studies literature university of innsbruck language english abstract this paper analyses the following poems un certainties by regi claire matthew francis ladybird summer mary mccollum s the boy with dark eyes and fox by phoebe stuckes which all distinguish themselves due to their non traditional form and structure illustrates deviation but consistency in the use of form and structure to convey meanings as intended by authors the form and structure of a poem affects its meaning as desired by the poet several elements of form and structure help poets manipulate words to ensure that their poems elicit the desired outcome some poems provide a narration others express feelings inform an audience or tell folklore depending on this poets use different elements of form and structure such as placement lengths of lines groupings of stanzas and lines rhyme scheme and rhythm to achieve the desired effects the shape of the poem as well as opening and closing stanzas offer insight into traditional poems while these conventional poems follow particular rules of poetry such as rhymes or a set amount of syllables per line more modern poetry disregards these rules and thereby introduces new methods of deriving meaning

seminar paper from the year 2014 in the subject american studies literature grade 1 7 university of duisburg essen anglophone studies course a survey of american literature language english abstract as the first female poet who was included into the regularly male canon of poetry emily dickinson is one of the few popular american poets of the 19th century another equally influential contemporary american poet may only be walt whitman whose main work was the poetry collection leaves of grass of 1855 emily dickinson s collection of poems contains nearly 1800 pieces they cover a variety of different topics the motifs of life love marriage nature faith and death run through her poems like a thread

dickinson has her very own view on the human ability to make sense of the world looking at the world theologically more liberal than other contemporary authors because she is estranged from religious beliefs she doubts the ideals of adjustment and perfection and thus tries to attain truth by holding the view that the world is in constant progression in order to describe this view appropriately i will first of all give an overview of biographical historical and cultural facts of emily dickinson after providing this background information i will introduce some of emily dickinson s poetic themes and strategies and analyse selected poems of her the analyses are intended to underline my findings and serve to give an overview of the stylistic elements dickinson uses to illustrate her view on the human ability to make sense of the world i will conclude my outcome by explicating to what extent emily dickinson s poetry has been a poetic contribution to american literature until today

the essence of true love is in the yearning not in the consummation this literary analysis of the song of songs employs the methods of new criticism each analysis aims to uncover the messages conveyed by the poems and the inner world of the characters the analysis brings to the fore the highly sophisticated and the original creativity of the love poetry of the song of songs in the introduction the question is posed as to whether the song of songs is an anthology or one literary whole after discussing the strengths and weakness of the various approaches the author proposes a novel structure for the book predicated on the various genres of the love poems assis discerns poems of physical description poems of adoration and poems of yearning in addition he discerns what he takes to be a previously unrecognized genre poems of rendezvous a new structure which is based on a psychological understanding of passionate love is now discovered one of the undisputed dominant features of passionate love is the longing for union with the beloved based on this premise the book is divided into five sections each of which ends with an attempt to unite or in a union the structure of the book reflects an emotional and inner development in the psyche of the lovers and in the relationship between them throughout the book the interrelationships between the various genres of the love poems and the development of the characters is spelled out
