with customary incisiveness quine presents logic as the product of truth and grammar but argues against the doctrine that the logical truths are true because of grammar or language rather in presenting a general theory of grammar and discussing the boundaries and possible extensions of logic he argues that logic is not a mere matter of words

in lively and readable prose arthur presents a new approach to the study of logic one that seeks to integrate methods of argument analysis developed in modern informal logic with natural deduction techniques the dry bones of logic are given flesh by unusual attention to the history of the subject from pythagoras the stoics and indian buddhist logic through lewis carroll venn and boole to russell frege and monty python a previous edition of this book appeared under the title natural deduction this new edition adds clarifications of the notions of explanation validity and formal validity a more detailed discussion of derivation strategies and another rule of

inference reiteration
