making sense of social research methodology a student and practitioner centered approach introduces students to research methods by illuminating the underlying assumptions of social science inquiry authors pengfei zhao karen ross peiwei li and barbara dennis show how research concepts are often an integral part of everyday life through illustrative common scenarios like looking for a recipe or going on a job interview the authors extrapolate from these personal but ubiquitous experiences to further explain concepts like gathering data or social context so students develop a deeper understanding of research and its applications outside of the classroom students from across the social sciences can take this new understanding into their own research their professional lives and their personal lives with a new sense of relevancy and urgency this text is organized into clusters that center on major topics in social science research the first cluster introduces concepts that are fundamental to all aspects and steps of the research process these concepts include relationality identity ethics epistemology validity and the sociopolitical context within which research occurs the second and third clusters focus on data and inference these clusters engage concretely with steps of the research process including decisions about designing research generating data making inferences throughout the chapters pause and reflect open ended questions provide readers with the space for further inquiry into research concepts and how they apply to life research

michelle kosch s book traces a complex of issues surrounding moral agency how is moral responsibility consistent with the possibility of theoretical explanation is moral agency essentially rational agency can autonomy be the foundation of ethics from kant through schelling to kierkegaard there are two complementary projects here the first is to clarify the contours of german idealism as a philosophical movement by examining the motivations not only of its beginning but also of its end in tracing the motivations for the transition to mid 19th century post idealism to schelling s middle and late periods and ultimately back to a problem originally presented in kant it shows the causes of the demise of that movement to be the same as the causes of its rise in the process it presents the most detailed discussion to date of the moral psychology and moral epistemology of schelling s work after 1809 the second project which is simply the first viewed from a different angle is to trace the sources of kierkegaard s theory of agency and his criticism of philosophical ethics to this same complex of issues in kant and post kantian idealism in the process kosch argues that schelling s influence on kierkegaard was greater than has been thought and builds a new understanding of kierkegaard s project in his pseudonymous works on the basis of this revised picture of their historical background it is one that uncovers much of interest and relevance to contemporary debates

hitchcock was a masterful director popular with audiences of all ages and critically acclaimed both during and after his unusually long career what may have been sensed by many viewers but not fully articulated until now is the extent to which his works subtly engage philosophical themes what is evil and how does it shield and reveal itself can we know what is inside the mind of another

person what is at stake when one knows the truth but cannot speak of it or cannot persuade others how is hitchcock s loving critique of humanity manifested in his films why are hitchcock s works so often ambiguous what is the hidden purpose and theory behind his use of humor hitchcock employs cinematic techniques from camera angles and use of light to editing and sound partly to convey suspense and drama but also to engage and advance philosophical issues ranging from identity crises to moral ugliness roche unlocks hitchcock s engagement with philosophical themes and he does so in a way that appeals to both the novice and the seasoned philosopher as well as enthusiastic admirers of hitchcock s films

this work has been selected by scholars as being culturally important and is part of the knowledge base of civilization as we know it
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they are often portrayed as outsiders ethnic minorities the poor the disabled and so many others all living on the margins of mainstream society countless previous studies have focused on their pain and powerlessness but that has done little more than sustain our preconceptions of marginalized groups most accounts of marginalization approach the subject from a distance and tend to overemphasize the victimization of outsiders taking a more intimate approach this book reveals the personal moral and social implications of marginalization by drawing upon the actual experiences of such individuals multidisciplinary and multicultural identity on the margin addresses marginalization at a variety of social levels and within many different social phenomena going beyond familiar cases dealing with race ethnicity and gender to examine such outsiders as renegade children conservative christians and the physically and mentally disabled and because women are especially subject to the effects of marginalization feminist concerns and the marginalization of sexual practices provide a common denominator for many of the essays from problems posed by

complimentary racism to the status of gays in tony blair s england from the struggle of native americans to preserve their identities to the singular problems of single mothers identity on the margin takes in a broad spectrum of cases to provide theoretical analysis and ethical criticism of the mechanisms of identity formation at the edges of society in all of the cases the authors demonstrate the need for theory that initiates social change by considering the ethical implications of marginalization and criticizing its harmful effects bringing together accounts of marginalization from many different disciplines and perspectives this collection addresses a broad audience in the humanities and social sciences it offers a basis for enhancing our understanding of this process and for working toward meaningful social change
