why are some white middle class activists experiencing difficulty creating alliances across racial and class differences what are the obstacles and what is being done to overcome them what type of movement structures cultures and practices can best facilitate inter racial inter class solidarity stories of inclusion explores these questions through an ethnographic study of a predominately white middle class contemporary peace and justice network that is working to create a racially and class diverse community of activists addressing a very significant and greatly under researched topic stories of inclusion raises important and critical questions for the peace movement as well as larger society in accessible prose this study bridges the literatures of social movement theory critical race studies and feminist theory and offers new insight into how power and privilege can affect the process of creating inclusive communities drawing on data the author collected through in depth interviews interpretive focus groups and over two years of participant observation this study explores how white middle class privilege influences political analyses definitions of peace work and approaches to alliance building the findings are compelling and reveal that even those who have developed an oppositional political consciousness and have pledged to work across racial and class divides can still foster exclusive organizing practices this study also offers examples on how some activists are acknowledging privilege transforming their worldviews and beginning to establish fruitful relationships across differences this important work emphasizes the continuing importance of race for those collective actors attempting to construct inclusive movements across diverse groups while also offering important practical solutions on how to bridge differences the conclusion offers a framework for building a new agenda for the peace and justice movement

a twentieth anniversary edition of this tour de force in feminism and indigenous studies now with a new preface the twentieth anniversary of the original publication of this influential and prescient work is commemorated with a new edition of talkin up to the white woman by aileen moreton robinson in this bold book of its time and ahead of its time whiteness is made visible in power relations presenting a dialogic of how white feminists represent indigenous women in discourse and how indigenous women self present moreton robinson argues that white feminists benefit from colonization they are overwhelmingly represented and disproportionately predominant play the key roles and constitute the norm the ordinary and the standard of womanhood they do not self present as white but rather represent themselves as variously classed sexualized aged and abled the disjuncture between representation and self presentation of indigenous women and white feminists illuminates different epistemologies and an incommensurability in the social construction of gender not so much a study of white womanhood talkin up to the white woman instead reveals an invisible racialized subject position represented and deployed in power relations with indigenous women the subject position occupied by middle class white women is embedded in material and discursive conditions that shape the nature of power relations between white feminists and indigenous women and the unjust structural relationship between white society and indigenous society

progress research indicates that more than 80 percent of academic decisions regarding appointment curriculum tenure and promotion classroom pedagogy and student outcomes are made by the department chair in consultation with the faculty this book examines the multidimensional contributions that chairs make in advancing diversity within their departments and institutions in the representation of diverse faculty and staff in tenure and promotion curricular change student learning outcomes and departmental climate the scope and content of the book is not limited to institutions in the united states but is applicable to academic institutions globally in their efforts to address the access and success of increasingly diverse student populations it addresses institutional power structures and the role of the dean in relation to the appointment of chairs and their impact on the success of chairs from non dominant groups including female minority and lesbian gay transgendered individuals who serve in predominantly white male departments using qualitative and quantitative research methods the book analyzes predominant structural and behavioral barriers that can impede diversity progress within the academic department it then focuses upon the opportunities and challenges chairs face in their collaborative journey with faculty and administration toward inclusive departmental and institutional practices each chapter provides concrete strategies that chairs can use to strengthen diversity in the academic department addressed to department chairs deans faculty and administrative leaders in higher education in all western societies facing demographic change and global challenges this book offers a critical road map to creating the successful academic institutions that will meet the needs of our changing populations
