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includes all 4 books in Lynne Truss's gloriously funny crime series set in 1950s Brighton. A shot in the dark winner of the CrimeFest Last Laugh Award, Inspector Steine rather enjoys his life as a policeman by the sea: no criminals, no crime, no stress. So it's really rather annoying when an ambitious, not to mention irritating, new constable shows up to work and starts investigating a spate of burglaries. Could it be that Brighton is in need of a police force after all the men that got away? A Times Crime Novel of the Year, it's summer in Brighton and the Brighton Belles are on hand to answer any holidaymaker's queries, no matter how big or small. The quickest way to the station, how many pebbles are on the beach, and what exactly has happened to that young man lying in the deckchair with blood dripping from him to solve this latest fiendish murder: our trio of detectives must go undercover to infiltrate a notorious Brighton nightspot. Murder by Milk Bottle, shortlisted for the Comedy Women in Print Prize, the August Bank Holiday is approaching and after two extremely high profile murder cases, Constable Twitten is eagerly anticipating a quiet spell at work. But then they find the bodies and the milk bottles: three seemingly unconnected victims have all been killed with the same highly unusual murder weapon. Can our redoubtable trio solve the case and catch this most curious of killers before they strike again? Psycho by the Sea. It's September in Brighton and the city is playing host to weeks of endless rain and lashings of villainy. A violent criminal obsessed with hunting policemen has escaped Broadmoor and is rumoured to be headed towards the city. While at Gosling's department store, an American researcher has been found dead in the music section. Have Twitten, Steine and Co. finally met their match with this criminal mastermind?

This book explores how grammatical structure is related to meaning. The meaning of a phrase clearly depends on its constituent words and how they are combined. But how does structure contribute to meaning in natural language? Does combining adjectives with nouns, as in *brown dog*, differ semantically from combining verbs with adverbs, as in *barked loudly*? What is the significance of combining verbs with names and quantificational expressions, as in *Fido chased every cat*? In addressing such questions, Paul Pietroski develops a novel conception of linguistic meaning according to which the semantic contribution of combining expressions is simple and uniform across constructions. Drawing on work at the heart of contemporary debates in linguistics and philosophy, the author argues that Donald Davidson's treatment of action sentences as event descriptions should be viewed as an instructive special case of a more general semantic theory. The unified theory covers a wide range of examples, including sentences that involve quantification, plurality

descriptions of complex causal processes and verbs that take sentential complements professor pietroski also provides freshways of thinking about much discussed semantic generalizations that seem to reflect innately determined aspects of human languages designed to be accessible to anyone with a basic knowledge of elementary logic events and semantic architecture will interest a wide range of scholars in linguistics philosophy and cognitive science
