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this volume presents a collection of articles centring on the language of the mishnah and the talmud the most important jewish texts after the bible which were compiled in palestine and babylonia in the latter centuries of late antiquity despite the fact that rabbinic hebrew has been the subject of growing academic interest across the past century

very little scholarship has been written on it in english studies in rabbinic hebrew addresses this lacuna with eight lucid but technically rigorous articles written in english by a range of experienced scholars focusing on various aspects of rabbinic hebrew its phonology morphology syntax pragmatics and lexicon this volume is essential reading for students and scholars of rabbinic studies alike and constitutes the second in a new series studies in semitic languages and cultures in collaboration with the faculty of asian and middle eastern studies at the university of cambridge

this philological commentary offers students a gateway to knowledge of mishnaic hebrew through study of *pirke avoth* it has enabled generations of students to unlock with less pain and increased incentive the language of the rabbis as well as their mode of thinking and of operating students can use it to study on their own and it is equally effective as a textbook or supplement in the classroom the commentary covers differences between biblical and mishnaic hebrew helpful for students with some hebrew background as well as common idioms in rabbinic literature

meeting the need for a textbook for classroom use after first year hebrew grammar waltke and o connor integrate the results of modern linguistic study of hebrew and years of experience teaching the subject in this book in addition to functioning as a teaching grammar this work will also be widely used for reference and self guided instruction in hebrew beyond the first formal year extensive discussion and explanation of grammatical points help to sort out points blurred in introductory books more than 3 500 biblical hebrew examples illustrate the points of grammar under discussion four indexes scripture authorities cited hebrew words and topics provide ready access to the vast array of information found in the 40 chapters destined to become a classic work this long awaited book fills a major gap among modern publications on biblical hebrew

gunter stemberger s revision of h l strack s classic introduction to rabbinic literature which appeared in its first english edition in 1991 was widely acclaimed gunter stemberger and markus bockmuehl have now produced this updated edition which is a significant revision completed in 1996 of the 1991 volume following strack s original outline stemberger discusses first the historical framework the basic principles of rabbinic literature and hermeneutics and the most important rabbis the main part of the book is devoted to the talmudic and midrashic literature in the light of contemporary rabbinic research the appendix includes a new section on electronic resources for the study of the talmud and midrash the result is a comprehensive work of reference that no student of rabbinics can afford to be without

this volume offers a systematic and detailed description of early rabbinic hermeneutics as it can be reconstructed from the mishnah third century c e samely clarifies the conditions

of a modern appreciation of rabbinic hermeneutics and provides a unified set of concepts for its precise description based on modern linguistics and philosophy of language basic features of rabbinic hermeneutics and its difference from modern historical reading are explained and a catalogue of recurrent techniques of interpretation is defined

the present volume presents the english reader with a representative selection of current research into mishnaic hebrew by israeli scholars twenty two articles are included in this collection two introductory essays which provide a detailed overview of the modern study of mishnaic hebrew as well as twenty more investigations into specific topics of grammar and lexicon

professor moshe bar asher professor emeritus at the hebrew university and long time president of the academy of the hebrew language has published more than 200 articles and sixteen books and edited about 90 books and collections the vast majority of his work has been accessible however only to specialists who read modern hebrew or french bar asher s groundbreaking articles on the dialects of rabbinic literature are classics in more recent years he has brought the same breadth and depth of grammatical knowledge and philological acumen to the study of older classical hebrew texts including literary and epigraphic texts this volume presents studies of individual words and verses within the bible as well as broader thematic discussions of biblical language and its long reception history down through medieval scribes and modern lexicographers also represented are bar asher s penetrating studies of qumran texts and languages which illuminate both the linguistic traditions reflected in these texts and the scribal culture from which they emerged the third section contains studies of mishnaic hebrew there are both sweeping surveys of the field and its accomplishments and challenges and studies of specific phonological morphological syntactic and lexical features

the student is introduced to the grammar forms of expression and idiosyncrasies of rabbinic hebrew the book comprises 32 teaching units each with a phraseology section vocabulary and exercise texts historical and morphological aspects are discussed as well as syntax and usage there is an introductory survey of research into rabbinic hebrew and a detailed bibliography

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
