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one day in 1938 john dewey addressed a room of professional educators and urged them to take up the task of finding out just what education is reading this lecture in the late 1940s philip w jackson took dewey s charge to heart and spent the next sixty years contemplating his words the stimulating result of a lifetime of thinking about educating what is education is a profound philosophical exploration of how we transmit knowledge in human society and how we think about accomplishing that vital task most contemporary approaches to education follow a strictly empirical track aiming to discover pragmatic solutions for teachers and school administrators jackson argues that we need to learn not just how to improve on current practices but also how to think about what education means in short we need to answer dewey by constantly rethinking education from the ground up guiding us through the many facets of dewey s comments jackson also calls on hegel kant and paul tillich to shed light on how a society does can and should transmit truth and knowledge to successive generations teasing out the implications in these thinkers works ultimately leads jackson to the conclusion that education is at root a moral enterprise at a time when schools increasingly serve as a battleground for ideological contests what is education is a stirring call to refocus our minds on what is for jackson the fundamental goal of education making students as well as teachers and therefore everyone better people

some hundred years after john dewey worked to illuminate what it means to educate and how public education serves as the bedrock of democracy his seminal democracy and education speaks urgently not only to critical contemporary educational issues but to contemporary political issues as well as mania for testing forces a steadily narrowing curriculum dewey explains

why democracy cannot flourish if the chief influences in selecting subject matter of instruction are utilitarian ends narrowly conceived for the masses as such utilitarian subject matter is increasingly placed online isolating individual students and their electronic screens he insists that education happens not through direct instruction but indirectly by means of the environment where members of a community engage in meaningful tasks as the american population appears increasingly subject to rhetorical manipulation and ideological extremism dewey imagines the possibility of education cultivating habits of mind which secure social changes without introducing disorder insightful and inspiring dewey s classic reintroduces readers to educational and political possibilities hard to remember as political and corporate forces to work reshape american public schools in the service of global profit rather than democratic life myers education press s timely classics in education offer readers the opportunity to return to the original works of giants whose influence on education have persisted through the years critical introductions to each work offer information on the context of the original work as well as insights into current relevance for readers unfamiliar with each text the introductions provide entrance to the work for experienced readers the series offers an opportunity to return to original works untainted by the distortions of decades of interpretation unlike poorly produced facsimile editions timely classics are high quality products they can be adopted for use in many types of education classes perfect for courses in social foundations of education political and social foundations of education foundations of american education foundations of education introduction to education theory and policy philosophy and education history of american education and the philosophy of john dewey

to lend weight to his charge that the public school teacher has been betrayed and gravity to his indictment of the educational establishment for that betrayal jurgen herbst goes back to the beginnings of teacher education in america in the

1830s and traces its evolution up to the 1920s by which time the essential damage had been done initially attempts were made to upgrade public school teaching to a genuine profession but that ideal was gradually abandoned in its stead with the advent of newly emerging graduate schools of education in the early decades of the twentieth century came the so called professionalization of public education at the expense of the training of elementary school teachers mostly women teacher educators shifted their attention to the turning out of educational specialists mostly men administrators faculty members at normal schools and teachers colleges adult education teachers and educational researchers ultimately a history of the neglect of the american public school teacher and sadly teach ends with a plea and a message that ring loud and clear the plea that the current reform proposals for american teacher education the carnegie and the holmes reports be heeded the message that the key to successful school reform lies in educating teacher s true professionals and in acknowledging them as such in their classrooms

teaching should never be color blind in a world where many believe the best approach toward eradicating racism is to feign ignorance of our palpable physical differences a few have led the movement toward convincing fellow educators not only to consider race but to use it as the very basis of their teaching this is what education activist and writer pamela lewis has set upon to do in her compelling book teaching while black a new voice on race and education in new york city as the title suggests embracing blackness in the classroom can be threatening to many and thus challenging to carry out in the present school system unapologetic and gritty teaching while black offers an insightful honest portrayal of lewis s turbulent eleven year relationship within the new york city public school system and her fight to survive in a profession that has undervalued her worth and her understanding of how children of color learn best tracing her educational journey with its roots in the

north bronx lewis paints a vivid intimate picture of her battle to be heard in a system struggling to unlock the minds of the children it serves while stifling the voices of teachers of color who hold the key the reader gains full access to a perspective that has been virtually ignored since the no child left behind act through which questions surrounding increased resignation rates by teachers of color and failing test scores can be answered teaching while black is both a deeply personal narrative of a black woman s real life experiences and a clarion call for culturally responsive teaching lewis fearlessly addresses the reality of toxic school culture head on and gives readers an inside look at the inert bureaucracy heavy handed administrators and ineffective approach to pedagogy that prevent inner city kids from learning at the heart of lewis s moving narrative is her passion each chapter delves deeper into the author s conscious uncoupling from the current trends in public education that diminish proven remedies for academic underachievement as observed from her own experiences as a teacher of students of color teaching while black summons everyone to re examine what good teaching looks like through a powerful vision together with practical ideas and strategies for teachers navigating very difficult waters lewis delivers hope for the future of teaching and learning in inner city schools

imagine the success our children can have if all found school emotionally fulfilling unfortunately the reality is that far too many youth regardless of their social background don t enjoy school the premises policies and procedures that drive the conventional education model in the us create a system that reduces opportunities for self discovery many students become alienated from school rather than empowered by it consequently our youth underperform not only in school but also later on in the workplace ultimately they fail to fulfill their potential and the contribution they could otherwise give to society in don t let school get in the way of education author and education expert dr anane olatunji gives us a detailed look at the rift
