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deftly written and beautifully illustrated the worlds of medieval europe third edition presents a distinctive and nuanced portrayal of the greater west during its medieval millennium by integrating the histories of the islamic and byzantine worlds into the main narrative author clifford r backman offers an insightful detailed and often witty look at the continuum of interaction social cultural intellectual and commercial that existed among all three societies this compelling volume surpasses traditional textbook representations of the middle ages by balancing the conventional focus on political affairs especially those of northern europe with equally detailed attention to medieval society as it developed in the mediterranean in addition backman describes the ways in which the medieval latin west attempted to understand the unified and rational structure of the human cosmos which they believed existed beneath the observable diversity and disorder of the world this effort to recreate a human ordering of unity through diversity provides an essential key to understanding medieval europe and the ways in which it regarded and reacted to the worlds around it

conflict bargaining and kinship networks in medieval eastern europe takes the familiar view of eastern europe families and conflicts and stands it on its head instead of a world rife with civil war and killing this book presents a relatively structured environment where conflict is engaged in for the purposes of advancing one s position and where death among the royal families is relatively rare at the heart of this analysis is the use of situational kinship networks relationships created by elites for the purposes of engaging in conflict with their own kin but only for the duration of a particular conflict a new image of medieval eastern europe less consumed by civil war and mass death will change the perception of medieval eastern europe in the minds of readers this new perception is essential to not only present the past more accurately but also to allow for medieval eastern europe s integration into the larger medieval world as something other than an aberrant other

the modernization of the western world presents an overview of the history of western civilization and provides readers with the intellectual tools they need to comprehend how societies function and change covering western history from ancient history to the current era of globalization it draws on the tradition of historical sociology to describe the forces of social change and what they have meant to the lives of the people caught in the midst of them this second edition is revised throughout to bring the content up to date with recent developments and discusses key themes such as terrorism refugees the european union and multinational corporations it also includes a new chapter on the ancient world covering this era from the advent of urbanization and agriculture in the middle east to the fall of rome and emergence of christianity providing valuable historical context clear and concise this book succinctly illustrates the essential turning points in the history of western society and identifies the economic social political and cultural forces that are transforming the wider world to this day illustrated with maps and images

and containing a glossary and new boxed features explaining key concepts this is the perfect introductory book for students of the development of western civilization

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the birth and unfolding of phases in history from neolithic to world pueblo and u s history brings together four major works into a single arc of human time michael a susko argues that the rhythm of history is not confined to the rise of empires but begins in the neolithic with triadic 45 year generations that set the first phases of historical time in motion using this framework the book explores neolithic Çatalhöyük as a non empire model of symbolic and generational phasing this initial work is in progress world history through egypt judah israel rome and the medieval modern era contrasting empire based and prophetic alternatives ancestral pueblo history as a more egalitarian path outside empire s mold u s history as a largely empire driven model tempered by ideals of freedom and equality this panoramic view balances empire and non empire trajectories showing how civilizations universalize their visions either through force or through sharing covenant and inclusion written in accessible language yet grounded in rigorous patterning it invites readers to see history not as inevitable empire but as a set of choices that continue to shape our present and future

bringing together seven volumes of research michael a susko presents a grand synthesis of astronomical biological and cultural evolution using a logarithmic model he shows how the universe has unfolded in accelerating pulses from galaxies and planets to the rise of life and symbolic humanity this rhythm of time is then extended through the neolithic tells and into recorded history where generational phases reveal cultures growing and transforming in their own natural cycles three distinct measures of time logarithmic pulses triadic generational units and fifteen year historical generations converge to reveal a patterned fabric of change across billions of years and into the present moment the author demonstrates how time is not a smooth line but a structured unfolding marked by phases of complexity consciousness and cultural renewal the result is both a sweeping map of our past and a reflection on the nature of time itself its rhythms its surprises and its promise of transformations yet to come

for one two semester undergraduate courses in medieval history this comprehensive well balanced historical survey of medieval europe from roman imperial provinces to the renaissance covers all aspects of the history political literary religious intellectual etc with a focus on social and political themes it presents a complete picture of the complex process by which an ecumenical civilization that once ringed the basin of the mediterranean sea evolved into three other distinctive civilizations latin europe greek eastern europe and asia minor and islam this text differs from others on the subject in that it attempts to abolish traditional clichés regarding the middle ages and promotes critical thinking about our own time and society

a rosetta key for history generations revealing the phases of time this work reveals how generations form the hidden rhythm of history by charting time in 15 year generational intervals an approach first used by the medieval historian bede and later championed by the twentieth century philosopher josé ortega y gasset the author uncovers distinct phases that recur across civilizations rather than relying solely on yearly dating which can fragment historical awareness this generational lens exposes history s deeper coherence the phases found are 1 beginnings and testing 0 15 generations 2 establishment and unifying image beginning at 15 20 generations 3 consolidation and opening up 30 generations 4 crisis and creativity 40 generations 5 universalization and inclusion 50

generations and 6 renewal or rigidification 60 generations through detailed case studies egypt israel judah rome and the medieval modern era the author shows how each culture moves through these generational arcs revealing a pattern that mirrors the human life cycle the 30th generation often neglected by historians emerges as a pivotal phase of openness justice and illumination in sum a rosetta key for history does not merely present a new way to measure time it reveals the living architecture of history itself the sequel volume extends this discovery into the americas and contemporary civilization readers are invited on an intriguing journey in which generations become the rosetta key for understanding time s unfolding design
